In the 2 years that the Kansas legislature has been considering tax changes to attract hyperscale data centers, here's what has happened around the country

- Wisconsin enacted a permanent exemption on equipment and electricity, for investments of \$150M
- Arkansas granted a permanent exemption on equipment and electricity, for investments of \$500M
- Kentucky enacted a 25-year exemption for investments of \$450M
- Louisiana granted a 20-year exemption for investments of \$200M
- Michigan enacted a 25-year sales tax exemption for investments of \$250M
